 equally divided and sold for the payment of the said several annuities severally granted to the said
 Selvester and the said Margaret Atkote as aforesaid Moreover if the said John Atkote
 shall make default of payment of the sum of fifteen pounds for his part of the legacy
 of thirty pounds by the my will given to the said Anne Morrer and her children equally
 to be payed by the said John and William Atkote and shall not pay the same within
 one year after my decease according to the true intent and meaning of this my last
 will and Testament that then it shall and may be lawfull for the said Anne Morrer if
 she be living or if she be dead then for her children into the lands and tenements before
 devised unto the said John Atkote to enter and distresse for the sum of twenty
 pounds and the distresse and distresses there taken to drive take and carry away and the
 same to detayne and keepe untill the said sum shall be fully satisfied and payed the sum
 of twenty pounds for default of payment of the sum of fifteen pounds aforesaid
 And in like manner if the said William Atkote shall make default of payment of the
 sum of fifteen pounds aforesaid for his part of the said legacy of thirty pounds and
 shall not pay the same unto the said Anne Morrer and her children within one year
 next after my decease that then it shall and may be lawfull to and for the said
 Anne Morrer if she be living or if she be dead then for her children into the
 lands and tenements of the said William Atkote called Drapers to enter and distresse
 for the sum of twenty pounds and the distresse and distresses there founde and taken
 to drive take and carry away and the same to detayne and keepe untill the said sum
 of twenty pounds be fully satisfied and payed unto the said Anne Morrer and her children
 in witness to the my last will and Testament as well of all my lands and tenements
 as of all my goods and personall estate rentes and royalties the said
 John Atkote have sett my hand and seal the first day of October in the fourth
 year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord Charles by the grace of God King of
 England Scotland France and Ireland Defender of the faith etc and in the
 year of our Lord God. 1625 in the presence of those men whose names are
 hereunto written witnesses to the my will William Newland Draper Edward Gregory
 Augustinus Morland

 of October Anno Domini 1625 and in the first year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord
 Charles by the grace of God King of England Scotland France and Ireland Defender
 of the faith etc I Phillip Greenclay Citizen and Burgoer of London being at the
 present in good health and of perfect memory hereby be therefore given unto
 Almighty God confiding of the resurrection of death and the resurrection of the
 soul therefore make and declare this my last will and Testament in maner and forme
 followinge that is to saye First I comend my soule into the hands of almighty God
 trusting and most assuredly believing that by his thorough mercie and gracious dole and
 passion of my Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ I shall obteyne full and free pardon and
 remission and forgiveness of all my sinnes and that I shall after this life ended enjoy

I have given in the Kingdom of Heaven by the elect children of God for evermore my
 body I commit to God's care to be buried in my buriall at the discretion of my executor here
 after named. And after my body buried and buried all manner of charges my will and mind is that all
 manner of such temporal blessinges as God hath bestowed on mee I give and distribute
 the same as followeth. I give and bequeath unto my loving wife Alice Greenly the
 lease of my now dwelling house in St Nicholas Shambles in the parish of Christ Church in
 London and the estate right title interest and forme of years thereon to have and enjoy
 with all such goodes implements household stuffe and moveables whiche she shall remayne
 in the same house at the time of my decease. And I do also freely give unto the said
 Alice Greenly my wife my Chancel house in the parish of St Dunstons in London with all commodities
 and profitts to the same belonging. And I do also give and bequeath unto my sonne John Greenly
 the summe of forty shillings of lawfull money of England. And I do further give and bequeath unto my sonne John Greenly
 my dwelling house with all outhouses Barres Stables Gardens lands and grounds
 thereunto belonging or in any wise appertaining situate lying and being in the parish of St
 Stanton upon Arowe in the County of Northampton to him and his heires forever upon this
 severall conditions hereafter following that is to saye first that he the said John Greenly
 my sonne doe suffer my said wife Alice Greenly his mother freely to have and enjoy yearly
 and quietly with her servants and family to have their dwelling in part of my said house
 in the parish of Stanton Arowe aforesaid with in the new parlour and the good
 room over the same parlour with free ingress egress and regress thereunto during the
 terme of her natural life. Secondly that my said sonne John Greenly shall not in any
 time after my decease give a sufficient discharge in due forme of lawe to be made sealed
 and delivered unto my executor hereafter named of all such customary rents and person
 as shall in any waye be due or belong unto him out of my goodes chattels and estate
 whatsoever by the custome of the Citie of London or otherwise. And thirdly that if the
 said John Greenly my sonne doe and shall presently after my decease pay in good and
 sufficient service well and truly to paye or cause to be payed unto my sonne Phillip
 Greenly his brother the summe of two hundred pounds of lawfull money of England by
 twelve poynts every yere yearly quarterly to be payed by even persons towards
 his better reliefe and maintenance. And if my said sonne John Greenly shall denye
 and refuse to do contrary to my will and meaning hereon declared then I give devise
 and bequeath the same dwelling house with all outhouses Barres Stables Gardens or
 Gardens lands and grounds thereunto belonging or in any wise appertaining situate
 lying and being in Stanton Arowe aforesaid unto my loving wife Alice Greenly
 and to her heires forever. And I do also give and bequeath unto my said sonne Phillip
 Greenly the summe of two hundred pounds of lawfull money of England to the said Phillip
 Greenly my sonne by twelve poynts every yere quarterly to be payed by even persons
 for his better reliefe and maintenance. And I give and bequeath unto my daughter
 Alice Dawle of London widow the summe of five hundred pounds of lawfull money of England
 the rest and residue of all and singular my goodes chattels creditte debte plate ready
 money and estate whatsoever I wholly give and bequeath unto my loving wife Alice
 Greenly my wife I do make my full and sole executor of this my last will and testament
 revoking all former wills and of none effect. In witness whereof I the
 said Phillip Greenly have sett my hand and to the last of Leon my hand and seal the
 day and yere first above written Phillip Greenly Signed sealed delivered
 pronounced and declared as his last will and Testament of the said Phillip
 Greenly in the presence of Edward Duck ser. and Thomas the cordoff

In the name of God Amen The fourth day of
 January in the fourth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord Charles by the
 Grace of God of England Scotland France and Ireland King Defender of the
 Faith and in the year of our Lord God 1638 compleate of Henry Mills of the parish
 of Wisborough Groves in the County of Suffeys woman being sick in body yet whole
 in minde & in perfect memorie of doe give God most hartie thanks therefore doe make &
 ordaine this my last will and Testament in maner & forme followinge. I give and
 bequeath my soule into the handes of almighty God my maker and I hope by the deathe and
 passion of Iesus Christ my Redeemer to be saved and my body to be buried in the churche
 yarde of Wisborough Groves from I give unto the high Church of Exeter four pounds
 from I give unto the poore people of Wisborough Groves and Rowwood four pounds of law
 lawfull monoy to be payed at the discretion of my exors hereafter named from I give
 unto Sirard Stehards my servant ten shyllings to be payed within half a yeare after my
 decease from I give unto William Leonard my servant five shyllings to be payed within
 half a yeare after my decease from I give unto Anne Mills my eldest daughter seven
 hundred pounds to be payed her within two monethes after my decease or at the day of
 her marriage whiche of them shall first happen from I give unto Joane Mills my youngest
 daughter four hundred pounds to be payed her when shee shall accomplish the age of one
 and twentie yeares or at the day of her marriage whiche of them shall first happen and
 if it should happen within the space of one yeare that either of my two daughters Anne or Joane
 should dye before the legacie hereof bequeatheth be due unto her so dyinge then my wille
 minde and will is that the legacie of her so dyinge shall remane the one half of it unto
 John Mills my sonne and the other half unto my other daughters whiche shall remane alike to be
 divided by even and equal portions from I give unto Mary Napper my daughter thirtie
 pounds of current English money to be payed her within one yeare after my decease from I
 give unto every one of my daughters Anne Mary and Joane one bed staddell one garter
 two bolsters two blanket one doublet and fower paire of shooes a peece the eldest to have
 the first choice the second the next and the youngest the third from all the rest of
 my goods Chattels Rightes and reditts moveable and immovable my double of fower my
 beinge payed my legacies repayed the charges of my funerall and the probacion of this my
 last will and Testament discharged I give them all unto John Mills my sonne and I doe
 ordaine and make my loving brother Edward Mills of Exeter and John Mills his eldest
 sonne exors in trust of this my last will and Testament givinge them full & lawfull
 authorite to buy and sell and to make their account upon my said sonne John shall accomplish
 the age of one and twentie yeares And I doe ordaine & make my loving neighbor
 Robert Whittington Esq. John Baker my Uncle and William Napper my sonne in lawe overseers
 of this my last will and Testament to see all things hereof performed And I give unto
 them for their paines & charges their necessaries expenses hereof to be taken twentie
 shyllings a peece And in witness that this is my last will and Testament I have said
 Henry Mills have hereunto sett my hand and seale the day and yeare Henry Mills Esq.
 the overseer of the parish of Wisborough Groves Roger Whittington Esq.
 and William Napper
