The last Will

and Testament of me Mary Gratwick of Bridgen in the parish of St. Mary in the County of Warwick, Dist. and Principality of Warwickshire, I remembering how frail my Condition was made me hoping for pardon and remission of my Sins and my Body to the Earth to be secretly interred in the Church Yard of St. Nicholas in the same Town with my departed Husband and as to my worldly property wherewith it hath pleased God to invest me I dispose of the same as follows I give and bequeath unto my Sister Sarah Taylor and my Nephew the sum of Five pounds each to be paid into their respective Hands and no other persons by my Executor within two months after my decease Item I give and bequeath after paying the above Legacies and all just Debts and funeral expences all and every my money household goods plate Jewels linen wearing apparel and Property of every description that I may be possessed of at the time of my decease to my Sister Elizabeth Allis for her sole use and benefit and I do hereby make and constitute and appoint my said Sister Elizabeth Allis sole EXECUTRICE of this my last Will and Testament In Witness whereof I the said Mary Gratwick the said Elizabeth Allis have to this my last Will and Testament subscribed my Name and affixed my seal the first day of March in the year of our Lord 1827 / Mary Gratwick signed sealed and published and declared by the said Testatrix Mary Gratwick as and for her last Will and Testament in the presence of us who in her presence at her request and in the presence of each other have herunto subscribed our names as Witnesses Robert Smith George Thomas Will^m Handley

This is the last Will

and Testament of me John Greenly of August Terrace City Road in the County of Middlesex Gentleman made this fifth day of September in the year of the Christian Era 1831 First I direct that I may be secretly and respectfully interred at the direction of my Executors hereinafter named and in the next place I direct that all my just Debts funeral and testamentary expences be fully paid and discharged so soon after my decease as conveniently may be and I give and bequeath all that my Share or Sum of £500 hundred pounds of and in the Amicable Society and at Servants Inn Street Street in London Apprais'd to me and payable or receivable immediately after my decease and all other moneys payable or receivable by virtue or in respect thereof and also all other my moneys and securities for money and also all Goods chattels household furniture plate linen China books wines and liquors and all and singular other my Personal Estate and Effects whatsoever and wheresoever and of what nature or kind soever the same may be of which I shall be possessed or entitled to or over which I shall have a disposing power at the time of my decease and whereto in remainder reversion expectancy or otherwise unto my own Wife Mary Greenly her Executors Adminors and assigns for her and their own absolute use and benefit and disposal And I hereby nominate constitute and appoint my said Wife Mary Greenly sole EXECUTRICE of this my last Will and Testament and I hereby revoke and make void all and every other Will or Wills at any time heretofore by me made and do declare this present writing contained in one sheet of paper to be my last Will and Testament In Witness whereof I the said John Greenly have herunto set my Hand and seal the day year first above written John Greenly (S) signed sealed published and m

demanded by the above named John Gibbs... as and for his last Will and Testament in the presence of us who at his request and in his presence and in the presence of other have the same subscribed our names as witnesses thereto.

at Exeter the 23rd June 1837 before the Honorable Chief Justice of Laws & Jurisdiction by the oath of Mary Gibbs Widow the sole Executrix to whom administration was granted among her first sworn duty to administer.

The last Will

and Testament of John Gibbs Esquire of the parish of Exeter in the County of Devon I give and bequeath unto Thomas Colpman and John Watson Executors the whole of my Estate and in personal Property household furniture stock ready money and all other of my personal Estate and Effects whatsoever and wheresoever for the use of my Wife Ann Gibbs so long as she remains my Widow and I further order the said Executors in Thomas Colpman and John Watson that when my youngest child shall arrive at the age of twenty one year they shall sell the whole of my Estate household goods stock and effects whatsoever and wheresoever and shall divide the residue equally amongst all my children I further wish if the said Executors think right that there should advance a portion of personal property to those children that have arrived to the age of twenty one year before the youngest child as attained that age but in such proportion as the said Executors shall think fit and that portion advanced if any to be deducted from the share of those children out of the residue. 26th 11th 1837 I do declare that this is my last Will and Testament John Gibbs Exeter witnesses 11th Saddington Sarah Gibbs Fanny Sophia Simon

On the 24th June 1837 administration with the Will annexed of the Goods chattels and Credits of John Gibbs late of Exeter in the County of Devon deceased was granted to Ann Gibbs Widow the next of kin of the said deceased and the universal legate being Widowhood named in the said Will having been first sworn (by Commission) duly to administer Executors Thomas Colpman and John Watson the universal legatees in trust named in the said Will having first sworn the letters of administration with the said Will annexed of the Goods of the said deceased.

I George Lambert Esquire of Exeter in the parish of Exeter in the County of Devon Gentlemen do make this my last Will and Testament in manner following (that is to say) it is my wish and desire to be buried in the Church yard of Exeter by the side of my late dear Wife I give and devise unto my son George Lambert Esquire for and during the term of his natural life the annual or yearly sum of Fifty two pounds of lawful money of Great Britain to be coming and payable out of and charged upon all that my inheritance farm and lands commonly called or known by the name of Collins situated in the parish of Exeter aforesaid and do direct the same to be paid to him by four equal quarterly payments on the twenty fourth day of June the twenty ninth day of September the twenty fifth day of December and the twenty fifth day of March in every year first and then of all conditions for Exats or on any account whatsoever the first payment thereof to be made on or about the said day of a payment as shall happen next after my decease I also give and devise unto my daughter in Law Mary the wife of my said son George Lambert Esquire for and during the term of her natural life the annual or yearly sum of thirty six pounds of lawful money of Great Britain to be coming and payable out of and charged upon all that my inheritance farm and lands commonly called or known by the name of Exeterwood situated in the parish of Exeter in the said County of Devon to be paid to her by four equal quarterly payments
